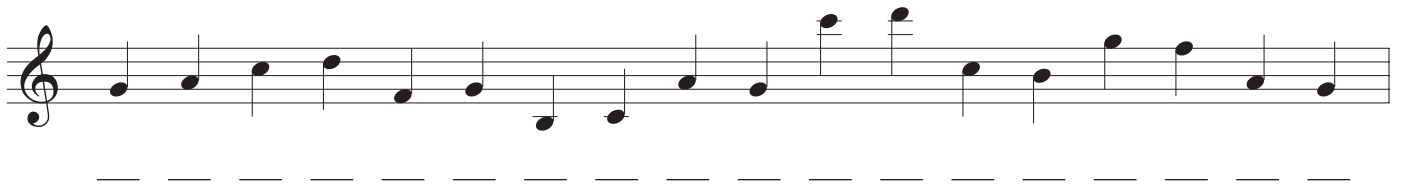


Music 110 Test #1 Preview

Our first written test is happening on **Friday, Sept 25**. I think it will be nice and easy and we will budget about 30 minutes to do it. You may use the keyboard (with headphones) during the test. Here is a preview of what will be on it.

Part A - Name some notes on the treble staff

I'll give you a line of notes and you say what they are. These will be in the Level Up Level Three format where every other note is a still a C or a G. This section will be worth 10 points, with each error costing one point.



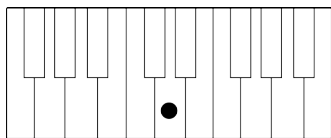
Part B - Put a count on some rhythms

I give you some rhythms, you mark them up with “1 + 2 +” etc. Include parentheses for beats that don’t make a new sound (because they have rests or long notes that keep going.) This will include some dotted note values that make the “heartbeat” rhythm from Worksheet #6. 3 of these @ 10 points each, each error costs 4 points.



Part C - Name some piano notes

This part is always nice for some easy points. 😊 I show you some notes on the keyboard and you tell me what they are. Include two possible names for the black keys (e.g. C#/D♭). 5 of these @ 4 points each.

Part D - Draw some scales on a piano keyboard

As the grand finale we will draw two major scales on the keyboard. You'll need to have the WWHWWWH pattern memorized and follow it to make good scales. 2 of these @ 15 points each.

I'll only ask for pretty easy scales that have 1-3 sharps or flats. If you want to practice by learning all of these, here is a list.

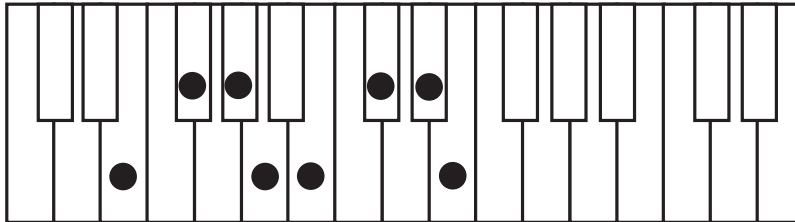
EASY FLAT SCALES

F major (1 flat)
B $\flat$ major (2 flats)
E $\flat$ major (3 flats)

EASY SHARP SCALES

G major (1 sharp)
D major (2 sharps)
A major (3 sharps)

EXAMPLE: E major (4 sharps)
